Hamburger Club

This bowl is going to Joe, an old friend who 8 years ago helped rescue me and a Viet Nam veteran, whom I was taking on a gold prospecting trip north of the Arctic Circle in Alaska. This individual found us by flying overhead with his plane and recording by GPS to find our location. My veteran friend and I were both suffering from hypothermia and my friend had a reaction from his Agent Orange exposure, shutting his body down. I tried to get help to get him out.



We found a gold prospector from 12 miles away to take my friend to a bush airport. A helicopter offered to retrieve him for \$23,000.00. My friend was flown to Bettles, Alaska, an Eskimo village. From there he was placed on a mail plane back to Fairbanks. He then hitchhiked to the hospital in Fairbanks where he was diagnosed with having less than 3 hours to live! After 4 days of intensive care, he survived!

Next it was my turn for rescue. My friend Joe and four of his friends found me and helped me canoe for 6 days down the Wild River. The bugs were ferocious. We ate ready-to-eat meals from Army survival kits to survive. Thankfully, no bears found us down this dangerous river. Log sweepers and rapids were a constant problem. After 6 tough days, we arrived in Bettles. Here I got a fresh shower and a dinner and a flight over to my truck, parked at Pump Station 5 on Ice Road to Prudhoe, AK.

I never had a chance to pan for gold; just happy to have survived! So, the bowl I made is going to be mailed to my friend Joe in Sutton, AK. Every year since saving me, he helps run a Bible Camp for all the Native children at a church camp north of the Arctic Circle. Joe flies his plane to pick up the children for camp. Flying a bush plane hundreds of miles is very expensive.

This last year he traveled the lower 48 states talking to church groups and asking for funds to help support his mission, Kingdom Air. Greg Just, from our club, engraved a bush plane in the bottom of the bowl. This bowl will be a gift from me for Joe to gather offerings for his Bible Camp. I have been collecting donations also to help advance this awesome charity. So as Paul Harvey always said, "Now you know the rest of the story."





Excerpts from a guest editorial by Mark Palma in Woodturning Magazine edition 393.

A SHOP IS A LIFELONG GIFT

I am walking into my father-in-law's shop. His funeral is in two days. He lived almost 89 years and was in his home up until the last week of his life. I reflect on the role of a shop in our life. If you have a shop, you have the foundation of a blessed life. It made me reflect on other shops, and the shops in my own life as well. Probably the pattern has some relevance to others so let's reminisce a little.

My paternal grandfather had a shop with a metal lathe, milling machine, forge, wood lathe (which he built himself) table saw and everything else. He was a watchmaker by trade and could build anything. He patented a design for a doweling machine and an all-metal fish bag. His shop was so full of bits of wood and metal you couldn't find footing to walk. I grew up in that shop and loved being taught how to turn threads on metal at 10 years old.

My first shop was at 14 when I got a candy counter from an old Woolworth store for free and set up a bicycle shop in my parents' basement. I loved tools in my hands and doing things, not realizing it would be a lifelong pursuit. At 16 my father's TV repair person quit. If he couldn't produce a repair technician to attend the training for repairing the new 'solid state' TVs, he would lose his RCA TV franchise. Well guess what, you are in the presence of a certified TV repair expert (eyeroll please). That was my second shop.





.A SHOP IS A LIFELONG GIFT (continued)

After college and newly married we were living in a condo 15 floors up from the ground. I converted the storage closet we were assigned into a shop and amazingly got a lot done out of that little closet that constituted my third shop. When we bought a house, my fourth shop was built in the basement with some cast-off cabinets. That shop grew with stationary tools and many hand tools. As a tax lawyer my partners were perplexed why I would bother doing things when you could just hire things fixed and made. They didn't understand the role of a shop in a person's life. My shop allowed me to make tangible things and take apart things that needed repair (I never said they all went back together).

I am currently in my fifth shop, a purpose built 28 by 72-foot building. It even has had a YouTube video shot about it. Fame aside, it is great to have a shop. This is the place where I learned to turn, build furniture, and unwind. Never do I walk into the door without expressing gratitude for having a shop. It has been central to my life, my journey of lifelong learning, and a place to create handmade items in a world of goods that arrive in containers.

I hope I have the privilege of having the ability to enter my shop throughout my remaining years and enjoy why we each have a shop. A place to go, to pass time, to create, get frustrated, use our hands and minds, and celebrate being one of the group of people who understand shops.


